

- Concept Papers still required and are due by March 1. Full Application due May 17, 2024
- Flint Hills, Topeka Metro, Lawrence, and St. Joseph (MO) MPOs are eligible applicants

 On-line application – hard copies and flash drives with digital docs no longer accepted



New!

- Safe Routes to School non-construction projects changes:
 - Fund at 100% using KATE state funds for required 20% match
 - No max on Master Plan development
 - PE removed as stand-alone option
 - •Continued: max on education and programming at \$50,000.

What is Safe Routes to School?

- Multi-faceted approach that promotes walking, biking, and rolling to school using policies, programs, and projects.
- The goal of SRTS is to get more kids walking, biking, and rolling to school, improve safety, and increase health and physical activity.
- In addition, SRTS programs seek to decrease the number of families driving to school, which can reduce traffic, improve air quality, and reduce costs for families.



KDOT's Seven Es



Education

Ensure that everyone learns how to travel safely through classes, training, and events that teach the skills needed to walk, bike, and roll safely.



Engineering

Provide infrastructure like sidewalks, paths, and crossings that allow people to walk, bike, and roll safely within the community and to and from schools.



Encouragement

Promote and generate enthusiasm around walking and bicycling as ways to travel using events, activities, and programs.



Engagement

Listen to and empower students, families, teachers, community groups, and school leaders in creating a SRTS program that works uniquely for them.



Evaluation

Track progress toward achieving goals by reporting on and assessing what approaches work (or don't) and identifying program changes that can improve outcomes.



Equity

While improving safety for everyone, pay special attention to ensure safe, healthy, and fair outcomes for students with disabilities, low-income communities, communities of color, English language learners, and families experiencing homelessness.



Enforcement

Increase compliance with traffic and parking laws in school zones and help reduce common unsafe driving behavior, such as speeding, failing to yield to pedestrians, turning illegally, or parking illegally.



Why the 5 Es?

- Proven to increase percent of school kids walking, biking and rolling to school
- Reduces traffic danger, congestion and increases safety for everyone
- Lower transportation costs on school and families
- Healthier students and improved academic performance




Category: Education and Programming Community must have a SRTS Master Plan to be eligible

Review Process

- Project Concept Forms are required and will be due 3/1/24
- Feedback and Application Packets will be given to all applicants, no later than March 31, 2024
 - Project Concepts will be reviewed as they are received, and application links emailed once initial review of each project is complete
- Applications are due May 17, 2024
- Review period to go through end of June
- Awards expected to be announced in Summer





WAMPO FHWA Adjusted MPO and Urbanized Boundaries







Expenses- Allowed and Not Allowed



Development and delivery of SRTS-related programs (walking school bus, bike trains, traffic education, crossing guards, traffic gardens, remote drop off, and more)	Projects that do not specifically serve the stated purposes of the SRTS Program	
Public awareness campaigns	Food or beverage or gift cards for food/beverage	
Planning and development of events or materials that promote walking and biking	Infrastructure projects that are not ADA compliant	
Pop-up events or demonstration projects that could test out future walking and/or biking infrastructure	Giveaways or prizes with no safety or education value (hats, t-shirts, shoes)	
Creation and reproduction of promotional and educational materials	Recurring costs. For example, SRTS funds cannot be used for crossing guard salaries, however, funds may be used for crossing guard program development (training, supplies, etc.)	
Travel Passes: Transit passes	Projects that reorganize pick-up and drop-off primarily for the convenience of drivers rather than to improve safety for students walking and bicycling	
Bicycle and pedestrian safety curricula, materials and trainers	Projects whose only purpose is to upgrade curb ramps to be ADA-compliant or replace school zone signage	
Training, including SRTS training workshops that target school- and community-level audiences.		
Costs for data gathering, analysis, and evaluation reporting at the local project level.		
Costs for additional law enforcement or equipment needed for enforcement activities around schools.		
Equipment and training needed for establishing crossing guard programs.	Kansas Safe Routes to School	
Modest incentives for SRTS contests (such as pencils, stickers, bags, etc.)		
Safety and educational tokens (helmets, reflective items, etc.)	1	


Compliance


