According to the Hutchinson News, the Fire Marshal's office is offering a new grant program to help recruit firefighters to volunteer or part-time departments around the state. The \$200,000 Fire Marshal Fee Fund will pay for firefighter safety gear, physical exams and other regionally shared equipment. The grants will not require local matches. The grant program also could be used to fund youth Explorer programs, to help interested young people learn about fire fighting. The deadline for submitting applications is Oct. 3, with funding available on a first-come, first-serve basis. The agency will announce the awards by Dec. 1.

Condolences to co-workers, friends and family of KDOT employee Nathan Sams, who died on July 12. Sams worked at the Grainfield Subarea office since 2012.



Traffic Safety

A simple message: KDOT launched a new radio advertisement this month aimed at getting drivers to slow down, particularly on K-10 between Lawrence and Lenexa. The ad explains that 25 percent of fatal crashes in Kansas are speed related and states, "In fact, speeding is such a factor on Highway K-10 that we're buying air time to tell you." There aren't any fancy sound effects or jingles, it's a straight-forward message encouraging drivers to slow down and pay attention. All aboard: Interim Secretary Richard Carlson rode a special train with Amtrak President and CEO Joe Boardman on Aug. 4 from Topeka to La Junta, Colo. Boardman was meeting with state and local officials and inspecting the progress being made to preserve the route for the Amtrak Southwest Chief passenger train and improve BNSF freight service.

Successful grant applications led by Garden City and La Junta have resulted in \$27.6 million in federal TIGER funding in the past two years. State support and contributions from Amtrak (\$8 million), BNSF (\$4 million) and other communities have led to the replacement of jointed rails and ties nearing the end of their service between Hutchinson and Waldo, New Mexico.

Vast improvement: The Old Fort sign at the Fort Scott National Historic Site was in dire need of repair, and some of the locals were complaining about the way it looked. Contractors were contacted yet there was no interest in submitting a bid for the work.

Three KDOT employees stepped up to lend their skills and expertise to stripping off the old paint and repainting the sign. Shane Drybread, then an Equipment Mechanic at Iola and now the Equipment Inspector at Chanute, previously operated an auto body repair shop. Drybread was familiar with the necessary processes of prepping and detailing, which he applied to the sign repair. Roy Widmar, Subarea Supervisor at Fort Scott, and Equipment Operator Charley Clay of Fort Scott



volunteered to do most of the labor on the project, with Drybread's assistance.

"The final product really turned out great. These employees were willing to take on a task that as equipment operators we normally do not do," said Darrin Petrowsky, Area Engineer at Iola.

Transload Facility

Garden City shipping center: KDOT will contribute \$4.5 million to Garden City to assist with the construction of its transload facility. Garden City was one of two sites selected to develop transload shipping centers last year. Great Bend and Garden City were chosen out of 111 sites that were initially proposed. KDOT will contribute \$4.5 million to the \$14 million Garden City project, \$3 million of which will go to rail construction and \$1.5 million for local roadway improvements. "We are excited to have KDOT partner with us on this project," said Lona DuVall, President of the Finney County Economic Development Group. "This facility will serve to further improve the competitiveness of our region and the state of Kansas in attracting new industries." The shipping center will be located southeast of Garden City and provide the infrastructure necessary to move goods from rail to truck and truck to rail. The facility is expected to be operational by December.
