### **Current Road Conditions**

KDOT crews continue to plow the accumulating snow on all Northeast Kansas roadways. All northeast Kansas counties are impacted by the current winter snow storm. *See the chart below for current roadway conditions for individual northeast Kansas counties.* Roadway conditions across all of northeast Kansas now are completely snowpacked/icy.

With continued falling snow throughout the overnight hours, KDOT crews will continue to plow to keep pushing the accumulating snow off the roadways. KDOT nighttime crews are now out and daytime crews have headed home to rest for their shift beginning tomorrow morning at 8 a.m.

Roadway conditions will remain snowpacked during the overnight hours. Once the snow stops sometime during the early morning hours, crews will then be able to plow and apply treatment (salt or salt/sand mixture) to accelerate melting so they can get to the roadway pavement.

Roads are slick and travel hazardous due to the snowpacked road conditions. If drivers must head out, they need to buckle up, TAKE IT SLOW, use caution, allow extra time and drive for the current roadway conditions for their evening commutes.

5. If they get stranded, to stay IN their vehicle and call \*47 on a state highway/interstate route (any highway that begins with I-, K-, and US-), \*KTA on the Kansas Turnpike, or #911 at anytime.

*For travel during winter storms, drivers should use caution, allow plenty of driving time, buckle up (every passenger, every time) and be sure to turn on their headlights, and turn off their cruise control. Drivers should also provide for a safe distance or cushion between themselves and vehicles ahead of them.*

*We also want to remind drivers to stay a safe distance back from KDOT snow plows, and if drivers should pass the snow plows, to be extra careful and allow plenty of room as the trucks do travel slower than surrounding traffic.*

**Current Road Conditions**

**KDOT crews continue to plow the accumulating snow and spot treating with salt or sand/salt mixture as needed on all Northeast Kansas roadways. All northeast Kansas counties are impacted by the current winter snow storm. See the chart below for current roadway conditions for individual northeast Kansas counties. Roadway conditions across northeast Kansas now are mostly (Kansas City Metro Area only) to completely snowpacked/icy.**

**With continued falling snow throughout the evening/overnight hours, KDOT crews will continue to plow to keep pushing the accumulating snow off the roadways. KDOT daytime crews will head home to rest up and nighttime crews will take over between 7-8 p.m. this evening to begin their 12-hour shift.**

**KDOT ENCOURAGES ALL DRIVERS TO STAY HOME THIS EVENING IF AT ALL POSSIBLE AS TRAVEL WILL BE HAZARDOUS. If drivers must head out, they need to TAKE IT SLOW, use caution, allow extra time and drive for the current roadway conditions for their evening commutes.**
