Current National Weather Service Forecast

Northeast Kansas, including Topeka/Lawrence Metro Area – UPDATED!

Today: Sunny and cold, with a high near 2. Wind chill values between -16 and -26. North wind between 10 and 15 mph.

Tonight: Mostly clear, with a low around -15. Wind chill values between -21 and -26. North wind around 5 mph.

Saturday: Sunny and cold, with a high near 6. Wind chill values between -16 and -26. North wind around 5 mph.

A WIND CHILL WARNING REMAINS IN EFFECT UNTIL NOON CST SATURDAY.

Winds and temperatures...sustained winds of 10 to 20 mph with gusts to around 25 mph will continue into Friday morning. This will couple with bitterly cold temperatures to produce wind chills from 22 to 32 degrees below zero. Wind speeds will diminish through the day Friday and into Friday night...but even colder temperatures will continue to produce dangerous wind chills through Saturday morning.

Impacts...the extreme wind chills will cause frostbite of exposed skin in a short period of time. The extreme cold may also cause any unprotected plumbing to freeze and burst. Blowing and drifting of snow will diminish with the winds Friday morning.

Precautionary/preparedness actions...conditions can deteriorate rapidly in winter weather situations...slow down and allow extra time when traveling. Practice your winter safety rules...keep an extra flashlight...food...and water in your car in case of an emergency.

Greater Kansas City Metro Area – UPDATED!

Today: Mostly cloudy and cold, with a high near 3. Wind chill values between -13 and -23. Northwest wind between 8 and 14 mph, with gusts as high as 21 mph.

Tonight: Partly cloudy, with a low around -10. Wind chill values between -16 and -24. North northwest wind between 6 and 8 mph.

Saturday: Sunny and cold, with a high near 6. Wind chill values between -14 and -24. North northwest wind between 3 and 7 mph

A WIND CHILL WARNING REMAINS IN EFFECT UNTIL NOON CST SATURDAY.

Timing...dangerously cold wind chills from 20 to 30 below zero will be common across the region by sunrise. The coldest wind chill readings approaching 30 below zero will be over far northwest Missouri. There will be a slight improvement during the day with wind chill readings expected to be in the 10 below to 20 below range. However...even colder air will make its way into the region tonight. By Saturday morning wind chill readings will range from 20 below zero in central Missouri to near 35 below zero over far northwest Missouri.

Winds...brisk northwest winds from 10 to 20 mph can be expected this morning with a few gusts to 25 mph over northern Missouri. The winds will gradually decrease throughout the day and by the afternoon hours the winds will be in the 10 to 15 mph range.

Impacts...these prolonged conditions will create a potentially life threatening situation for anyone caught outdoors and unprotected for more than a few minutes. Wind chills colder than 30 below will cause frostbite on exposed skin within 10 minutes. Although the winds will be gradually diminishing through the day some drifting of the snow is still likely...especially in more open rural areas and near the tops of hills.

Precautionary/preparedness actions... A winter storm warning for snow and blowing snow means severe winter weather conditions are expected or occurring. Significant amounts of snow and blowing snow are forecast that will make travel dangerous. Only travel in an emergency. If you must travel...keep an extra flashlight...food...and water in your vehicle in case of an emergency.

Current Road Conditions – UPDATED!

Road conditions overnight fluctuated from spots to partly snowpacked/icy to drifting throughout all of northeast Kansas. Drifting on the roadways continues to be a significant problem throughout all of northeast Kansas. The higher gusting winds are not forecasted for today, so if these winds do stay away, KDOT crews will have a better opportunity to clear the roadways and keep them that way, as the drifting will ease off.

Many of the interstate highways may have one or two (or more in KC Metro Area) clear driving and/or passing lanes, though continued drifting does create recurring spotty snowpacked conditions. Some

second- and third-tier roadways continue to drift close, though crews are working to keep as many open as possible. *See below for a current list of road closures for northeast Kansas.*

Highways, including mainline lanes, ramp areas, bridges and overpasses, may be slick in spots due to the snowpacked/icy conditions, continued drifting snow and extremely cold single digit temperatures, so drivers need to use caution, take it slow and allow for extra time during the evening and overnight hours. Drivers should be mindful of possible black ice conditions on the highways, even if the pavement surface appears to be dry, the roadway surface may be icy. *See the chart below for current roadway conditions for individual northeast Kansas counties.*

Nighttime crews will head home and daytime crews will take over between 7-8 a.m. this morning. KDOT daytime crews will continue to focus on plowing and will spot treat only (salt/sand mixture) as needed throughout all northeast Kansas counties. Daytime crews will again monitor conditions today to see if those conditions lend themselves for more significant treating on the roadways during the daytime hours. Again, plowing is the primary method for dealing with the ongoing drifting conditions.

Driver Safety Tips

Please remind DRIVERS as they travel about to:

1. Take it SLOW!
2. Allow plenty of extra drive time.
3. Watch for icy/slick spots on the roadway; don't assume that if the pavement looks clear, that it is.
4. Buckle up every passenger, every time.
5. If they get stranded, to stay IN their vehicle and call *47 on a state highway/interstate route (any highway that begins with I-, K-, and US-), *KTA on the Kansas Turnpike, or #911 at anytime.

For travel throughout the overnight and into the early morning hours tomorrow, drivers should use caution, allow plenty of driving time, buckle up (every passenger, every time) and be sure to turn on their headlights, and turn off their cruise control. Drivers should also provide for a safe distance or cushion between themselves and vehicles ahead of them.

We also want to remind drivers to stay a safe distance back from KDOT snow plows, and if drivers should pass the snow plows, to be extra careful and allow plenty of room as the trucks do travel slower than surrounding traffic.

Current Road Closures for Northeast Kansas

K-87 in Marshall County is NOW CLOSED to all traffic from the Village of Vilets to the US-36 junction as of 10:40 a.m. Thursday, January 7, due to blowing and drifting snow which is causing the roadway to be impassable for drivers.

K-99 in Marshall County is NOW CLOSED to all traffic from the City of Beattie to the Kansas/Nebraska state line as of 7:45 a.m., Thursday, January 7, due to blowing and drifting snow which is causing the roadway to be impassable for drivers.

K-120 in Doniphan County is NOW CLOSED to all traffic from the junction of K-20/K-120 to the south city limits of Highland as of 5:00 p.m., Thursday, January 7, due to blowing and drifting snow which is causing the roadway to be impassable for drivers.

Updated Road Conditions (via phone or online 24/7)

Updated Kansas road conditions are at your fingertips. **KanDrive** is the new online travel info portal, www.KanDrive.org, that displays information from KDOT’s traveler information technology, including highway cameras, dynamic message signs, traffic management centers and 511 phone, online and mobile (<http://511mm.ksdot.org>). Snapshots from more than 30 closed-circuit cameras along I-70 between Topeka and Colorado and along other highways in the state, as well as camera views from the KC Scout system are available through the new online site, so users can see the roadway conditions.

Travelers can also obtain updated road conditions simply by calling 511 from any phone (landline or cellular), or by clicking on the following link: <http://511.ksdot.org>, drivers can obtain updated all of Kansas road conditions at **anytime, day or night.**
