Northwest Kansas/Eastern Colorado

I-70 is NOW OPEN from Colby - Westbound - to Airpark Road in Colorado (Exit 292).

K-27 Highway is NOW OPEN north and southbound from the Nebraska State Line to Goodland.

US-36 Highway is NOW OPEN east and westbound from Atwood into Colorado.

US-40 Highway is NOW OPEN east and westbound from Sharon Springs into Colorado.

Oklahoma

Highways in NE Oklahoma snow packed & hazardous. In mid-section (Red River to Kansas line) slick in spots.

Current Weather Forecast

Northeast Kansas, including Topeka/Lawrence Metro Area

This Afternoon: Snow likely and areas of blowing snow. Cloudy, with a high near 24. West wind around 15 mph, with gusts as high as 25 mph. Chance of precipitation is 70%. Total daytime snow accumulation of less than one inch possible.

Tonight: A 20 percent chance of snow. Cloudy, with a low around 14. West wind between 10 and 15 mph, with gusts as high as 20 mph.

Sunday: Mostly cloudy, with a high near 24. Northwest wind between 10 and 15 mph, with gusts as high as 20 mph.

Light snow falling across northeast Kansas will decrease in intensity and coverage through the day. Any additional snow accumulation today will remain one inch or less. However...northwest winds of 15 to 25 mph gusting to 30 mph will continue to produce blowing and drifting of the powdery snow through the day. Travel will remain difficult and hazardous today due to the heavy snow that has fallen over the past two days. Occasional light snow and flurries will linger into tonight however little or no additional accumulation will occur after dark tonight.

There are no active winter weather advisories in effect at this time.

Greater Kansas City Metro Area

This Afternoon: Snow and widespread blowing snow. High near 28. West wind between 16 and 18 mph, with gusts as high as 26 mph. Chance of precipitation is 80%. Total daytime snow accumulation of 1 to 2 inches possible.

Tonight: A chance of snow showers. Mostly cloudy, with a low around 21. West wind between 11 and 15 mph, with gusts as high as 22 mph. Chance of precipitation is 40%.

Sunday: A slight chance of snow showers before noon, then a chance for flurries. Mostly cloudy, with a high near 28. West northwest wind between 10 and 15 mph, with gusts as high as 22 mph. Chance of precipitation is 20%.

Light snow falling across eastern Kansas and western Missouri will slowly decrease in intensity and coverage today. Any additional snow accumulation today or tonight should remain around one inch or less. However...westerly winds of 15 to 25 mph...gusting to 30 mph...will continue to produce blowing and drifting of the powdery snow. This will make travel difficult and hazardous today as the heavy snow that has fallen over the past two days drifts across area roadways...especially ones that run north and south. Occasional light snow and flurries will linger into tonight...however little or no additional accumulation will occur after dark.

There are no active winter weather advisories in effect at this time.

Current Road Conditions

Light snow continues to fall and/or blow throughout parts of northeast Kansas. KDOT crews are on the roadways primarily plowing (with minor treating) on an ongoing basis. However due to the gusting winds, blowing snow and the cold temps, drifting continues to be a problem and it is proving difficult to keep roadways cleared. The roadways continue to drift and will throughout the day, due to the continued gusting winds. KDOT crews will begin more treating (salt or sand/salt mixture) today on area roadways to hopefully initiate some minor melting, along with the continued plowing.

Overall road conditions have recently changed for most areas from minor/no drifting to snowpacked/ice conditions. This is a favorable move in conditions as it means there is less drifting now and provides more opportunity for KDOT crews to work on clearing the roads and keeping them clear.

Many NE Kansas highways are still closed (see below) at this point in time. *See the chart below for current roadway conditions for individual northeast Kansas counties.*

Driver Safety Tips

Please remind DRIVERS if they must travel about to:

1. Take it SLOW!

2. Allow plenty of extra drive time.
3. Watch for icy/slick spots on the roadway; don't assume that if the pavement looks clear, that it is.
4. Buckle up every passenger, every time.
5. If they get stranded, to stay with their vehicle and call *47 on a state highway/interstate route (any highway that begins with I-, K-, and US-), *KTA on the Kansas Turnpike, or #911 at anytime.

For travel throughout the remainder of the day and overnight, drivers should use caution, allow plenty of driving time, buckle up (every passenger, every time) and be sure to turn on their headlights, and turn off their cruise control. Drivers should also provide for a safe distance or cushion between themselves and vehicles ahead of them.

We also want to remind drivers to stay a safe distance back from KDOT snow plows, and if drivers should pass the snow plows, to be extra careful and allow plenty of room as the trucks do travel slower than surrounding traffic.

Current Road Closures for Northeast Kansas

K-9 in Nemaha County from the K-63 junction to the Nemaha/Jackson County line is closed as of 3:55 a.m. Saturday, Dec. 26 due to blowing and drifting snow which is causing the roadway to be impassable for drivers.

K-20 in Doniphan & Brown Counties is closed as of 11:30 p.m., Thursday, Dec. 24 from the K-137 Junction to the K-7 Junction due to blowing and drifting snow which is causing the roadway to be impassable for drivers.

K-62 in Jackson County is closed as of 8:30 a.m., Friday, Dec. 25 from the K-16 junction to the K-9 junction due to blowing and drifting snow which is causing the roadway to be impassable for drivers.

K-74 in Atchison County is closed as of 4:00 a.m. on Saturday, Dec. 26 from the city limits of Potter to the US-73 junction due to blowing and drifting snow which is causing the roadway to be impassable for drivers.

K-87 in Marshall County is closed from VILLAGE OF VLIETS to the junction of US-36/K-87 as of 3:30 a.m. on Friday, December 25, due to blowing and drifting snow which is causing the roadway to be impassable for drivers.

K-99 in Marshall County is closed as of 11 p.m., Thursday, Dec. 24 from the junction of K-99/US-36 and 234 to the Kansas/Nebraska state line, snow has drifted the road shut. The roadway is impassable at this time due to blowing and drifting snow.

K-120 in Doniphan County is closed from the junction of K-20/K-120 to the south city limits of Highland as of 3:30 a.m. on Friday, Dec. 25, due to blowing and drifting snow which is causing the roadway to be impassable for drivers.

K-233 in Marshall County is closed as of 9:30 a.m., Friday, Dec. 25 from the US-77 junction to the west city limits of Oketo due to blowing and drifting snow which is causing the roadway to be impassable for drivers.

Updated Kansas road conditions are at your fingertips. **New!! KanDrive** is the new online travel info portal, www.KanDrive.org, that displays information from KDOT's traveler information technology, including highway cameras, dynamic message signs, traffic management centers and 511 phone, online and mobile (<http://511mm.ksdot.org>). Snapshots from more than 30 closed-circuit cameras along I-70 between Topeka and Colorado and along other highways in the state, as well as camera views from the KC Scout system are available through the new online site, so users can see the roadway conditions.
